

LETTER FROM THE MINISTER

Dear Friends,

It is now recognised that how we react to the events and circumstances of our lives can have an enormous impact on our mental and even physical health. As we think, we change the physical nature of our brain. As we consciously direct our thinking, we can wire out toxic patterns of thinking and replace them with healthy thoughts. New thought networks grow. We increase our intelligence and bring healing to our brains, minds and physical bodies. It all starts in the realm of the mind, with our ability to think and choose. Materialists might try to hold on to the idea that the brain generates all aspects of our mental experience, but this is more and more being shown to be simplistic and inaccurate. It is with our minds that we understand the truths set down in our spirits. It is with our minds that we wire these truths into the brain, which is part of our physical body. It is with our minds that we choose to develop the spiritual part of who we are. If we live into our negative thoughts and allow them to dominate our lives, there is a great danger that they will be self-fulfilling in our lives. We will find ourselves sinking into a pit of depression, we will be consumed by fears and anxieties. And that can have a major effect on our physical bodies. A recent study by the American Medical Association found that stress is a factor in 75 percent of all illnesses and diseases that people suffer from today.

On the other hand if we fill our minds with positive thoughts and lay hold of thoughts that inspire hope and faith we can displace any toxic, negative thoughts that could have such a destructive effect upon our bodies.

The Bible is full of words to inspire faith and hope. The writer of the Book of Proverbs has gathered together wise sayings that are a key to a healthy, fulfilled life and he encourages us to lay hold of his words and keep them in our hearts. The Good News Bible translates Proverbs 4.22, 'These words will give life and health to anyone who understands them.' And then he goes on to say in v.23, 'Be careful how you think. Your life is shaped by your thoughts.' So true. We have a choice in what we think about, what thoughts we allow space to in our minds. Martin Luther once said, "We can't stop birds flying over our heads, but we can stop them nesting in our hair." If we allow space in our minds to bitter thoughts of unforgiveness, they will consume us and twist us into less than the people we are meant to be. If we allow space in our minds to lustful thoughts they can lead us down a path that will find us treating others as objects through whom we can satisfy our desires. We can end up destroying marriages and damaging our own and other people's lives.

On the contrary Paul writes in Philippians 4.8-9, 'Fill your minds with those things that are good and that deserve praise: things that are true, noble, right, pure, lovely and honourable. Put into practice what you learned and received from me, both from my words and my actions. And the God who gives us peace will be with you.'

GARDEN OPEN DAY

The garden at Arndarroch will be opened to the public on Sunday 20th August and Saturday 26th August by the Dumfries and Galloway Canine Rescue. 40% of the proceeds will go to the Carsphairn Church Fabric Account which funds the repairs and maintenance at the church.

The garden at Arndarroch has been developed from the hillside over the last 26 years. The whole garden is wildlife friendly including the numerous rabbits! Many birds find nesting places in the trees and shrubs whilst others are helped by unusual nest "boxes". Garden waste material is used in the woodlands to provide homes for many mammals and countless smaller creatures.

There is a good collection of herbaceous perennials, trees and shrubs – some rare- and seats are available so that one can sit and savour the magnificent views.

Entrance to the gardens is £3.50, school children – and younger- free. Children enjoy the space and the intriguing corners of the garden and there will be a treasure hunt, with prizes, for them. Teas (all home baking) are £2.50 and there will be the usual excellent plant stall and small craft exhibition. The garden is open from 2 -5pm and dogs on leads are welcome. Teas will not be available on Saturday 26th.

Arndarroch is on the B7000 five miles from Carsphairn and Dalry.

Do go and look round the magnificent garden which some years ago won a highly commended certificate in a national competition organised by the Daily Mail. We are very grateful to Mrs Lindsay for this great opportunity not to be missed.

WORLD STAMP APPEAL

Thanks to everyone who collected used stamps and put them in the box in the church porch.

The collection was sent away at the beginning of March as our contribution towards the Church of Scotland World Mission 2016 project which was to help a scheme run by the Church of South India. I have since heard that the project raised £4334 which was approximately £800 more than the amount raised in 2015. This is quite amazing given the trend towards communicating in a fashion that does not need postage stamps.

This year the appeal's proceeds will go towards the purchase of books for the Giffen Institute of Theology in South Sudan. The Institute is run by the Presbyterian Church of South Sudan and 75% of the country's ministers are trained there. South Sudan is a landlocked country that gained its independence from Sudan in 2011. Since 2013 it has been embroiled in a civil war and the Giffen Institute has relocated twice and now is based in a refugee camp in Kenya. Many of the Institute's resources, including the library, have been destroyed.

Please continue collecting your used stamps. If you are unable to come to church please give them to your elder or someone who can put them in the box. Also please encourage others to keep their stamps, a small effort to contribute towards a very worthy project in South Sudan, a country that has so many problems.

FINANCIAL REVIEW 2016

An abridged version of the church accounts for 2016 is included with this newsletter. The accounts show an overall **deficit of £34**; not good news. However it was not surprising to find that the extraordinarily high annual receipts of 2015, our year of 200th anniversary celebrations, were not repeated in 2016. Total (ordinary, unrestricted) **receipts in 2016** were £3,476 less than in 2015 (after excluding grant income). However, following extraordinarily high Donations to our local Benevolent Fund, the overall shortfall is shown to be £34.

The really bad news was that 2016 receipts to Ordinary Unrestricted funds fell £1,649 short of payments made from these funds. Payments for Manse repairs and maintenance were high in 2016, but not exceptional when account is taken of a 2016 payment of £1,030 made for repairs done late in 2015.

Other 2016 costs were also not exceptional apart from Heat and Light costs, where necessary catching up followed many previous months of underpayments (Scottish Power billing failure).

The conclusion has to be that 2016 was a year of not enough ordinary giving to the church to meet ordinary costs.

Efforts will have to be made to try to increase annual giving and to contain spending in future years.

CHANGE OF TREASURER

Work has almost been completed for the handover to our new treasurer who is: Mrs Barbara Patterson, Clonmel, Crossmichael, Castle Douglas, DG7 3AW. We are grateful to her for agreeing to take on this job.

A new Gift Aid administrator has not yet been appointed. Until this happens it is still David Richmond: Merecleuch, Ballplay Road, Moffat, DG10 9JU.
