# Glenkens Worship Resources for Sunday 13th September 2020

I lift my eyes to the quiet hills in the press of a busy day; as green hills stand in a dusty land so God is my strength and stay.

### Philippians 2: 12 - 18 (NIV)

#### Reflection

Many in our society are unwilling to take responsibility for their actions. Rather than accept responsibility there is a tendency to try and shift responsibility, whether to blame the government, employers, doctors, teachers, children, parents, husbands, wives — there is always someone else to blame rather than admit one's own responsibility. Of course this goes right back to the story of the Garden of Eden. When Adam ate of the forbidden fruit in the garden, he blamed the woman for giving it to him to eat. And the woman? She blamed the serpent for deceiving her. All of us find it easy to point the finger at someone else when we're blamed for something to try and lessen our own responsibility.

But Paul does not take the Philippians down this route. He urges them to take responsibility for their lives and to take a responsible attitude to the society around them. And he starts the section we read out today with the words, 'Therefore, my dear friends, as you have always obeyed – not only in my presence, but now much more in my absence – continue to work out your salvation with fear and trembling, for it is God who works in you to will and to work for his good purpose.' He starts off by saying 'therefore'; and what he says follows on from the previous passage we looked at last week where he speaks of Jesus humbling himself and taking the nature of a servant and being obedient even unto death – death on a cross. It is because Jesus has set us an example that we are to follow his example and in obedience work out our own salvation under God's guiding hand. Indeed, you could say it is the only appropriate response to Jesus' sacrifice on our behalf.

'Salvation' perhaps for some of us has become a bit of meaningless religious jargon. 'Are you saved?' What exactly does it mean? A word to use in its place could be the word 'freedom'. To be saved by Jesus Christ is to be set free. Jesus sets us free from our guilt, our addictions, from our fears, and, above all, from our fear of death. He sets us free to know God, to love others and to be our true selves, as God made us and meant us to be. So what Paul is really saying here in Philippians is 'Therefore, my dear friends, continue to work out your <u>freedom</u> with fear and trembling...' This is different from working *for* our freedom. We are not trying to earn our freedom, earn our salvation. Rather our freedom in Christ is a possession that we already have as Christians and that we need to explore and enjoy ever more fully. It's a bit like marriage. Marriage once possessed is possessed in full, but merits a life time of exploration, enjoyment, development and discovery. So we need to work out our freedom in Christ day by day, entering ever more fully into its reality and claiming its benefits ever more fully, as we put to death our fears and guilt.

But we need to remember that God has set us free for a purpose – to know his love, and then in the security of his love to go on to find creative fulfilment as we give of ourselves in love and service to others. That is why we need to work out our freedom in fear and trembling. It is possible to have a saved soul and a wasted life.

There is a careful balance in Paul's wording of this sentence. We are to 'work out' our salvation because it is God who 'works in' us. Our freedom is a gift from God and even in the working out of it we need his help. God's work in us includes our wills. He works in us 'to will and to act according to his good purpose'. Sometimes we're afraid to trust God with our futures, because we fear that God will make us do something that we have no desire to do. But that fear is groundless. If our will is surrendered to his will, God will give us the desire to do whatever he is calling us to do. If we surrender to his will, he will work out 'his

good purpose'. What he wants for our lives is good. It won't necessarily be easy, but we won't be able to improve on his purpose. In fact, working out our salvation means fulfilling our potential as the whole person we were created to be.

Paul calls us to live blameless and pure lives that we might become children of God without fault in a crooked and depraved generation. Here are two descriptions of young people in society:

'I see no hope for the future of our people if they are dependent on the frivolous youth of today, for certainly all youth are reckless beyond words... When I was young we were taught to be discreet and respectful of elders, but the present youth are exceedingly impatient of restraint.'

Those words were penned by Hesiod, a Greek poet of the eighth century BC. Here's a more recent description:

'The children now love luxury; they show disrespect for elders and love chatter in the place of exercise. Children are tyrants, not the servants of their households. They no longer rise when their elders enter the room. They contradict their parents, gobble up dainties at the table, cross their legs and tyrannise their teachers.'

That one comes from Socrates in the fifth century BC. Nothing has really changed! In a world that always was like that and always will be like that – a world that is in rebellion against God will always be like that – we are called to shine like stars in the universe as we hold out the word of life. As Christians we are called to live lives that are noticeably different from those around us – not in a self-righteous kind of way. We are called to do everything without complaining or arguing - not to be those who always murmur against God and against other people, not to be those who are difficult to keep company with. Rather praise of God and of others should characterise our lives, so that we 'may become blameless and pure, children of God without fault'. As children of God we are called to bear more and more the likeness of our Elder Brother, even Jesus, the Only Begotten Son of the Father who came down to us to lead us back to God.

We are called to be in the world but not of the world - to take on responsibilities within our communities and seek to influence things for good, to do our bit for our fellow men and women. Sadly too many in our day are unwilling to take on responsibilities. We all have a role to play within our communities. God never intended us to live isolated lives cut off from our fellows behind the closed doors of our homes. Thank God that in the current pandemic we have other ways of networking with others!

Our responsibility involves not just our lifestyle but also our lips. We have a responsibility to 'hold out the word of life' to a society desperately needing God. Many around us are dissatisfied because they have never found the relationship with God for which they were made. Rather than timidly keeping that good news to ourselves for fear of offending others or being rebuffed, we need to be bold to point others to the God who loves them and has good purposes for them, even as one hungry beggar might show another hungry beggar where to find food. May you go in God's strength to live for him and serve him. In that is life, life in all its fullness.

May we enthrone you in our hearts and go wherever you may lead us — learn to be responsive to your still small voice nudging us within and showing us the way we should go, the people we could give a helping hand to, the folk to whom we could give an encouraging word. May your Spirit empower us to step out beyond our comfort zone and prove your faithfulness in new ways.

We pray for those who mourn, that they may be comforted. We pray for those who need to know your healing touch upon their lives, that they might know your healing in spirit, soul or body. We pray for those overwhelmed by events in their lives or in the world. Speak words of hope and reassurance to them; set them free from their fears and help them to entrust themselves into your hands. Lord Jesus, you are the Light of the world, and you have shone your light into our hearts and lives. May we reflect it out into the lives of those we are in
